The preparation company came in and tore up all the flooring and old playground. Then, they put in the new base concrete and then the installation company came. They put in all the actual structure and then did the flooring.

Peekskill used a grant from Dasney of \$200,000 but it also used its own \$90,000 for some of the improvements in the new playground. They put in better padding for a safer experience.

If you're wondering what a recall is, it is when something goes wrong with a product and the owner has to take it off the shelves. The companies that got the recall are Boar's Head and Old Country.



These meat brands were affected by listeria

causing illnesses such as fevers, headaches, confusion, etc. On September 13, 2024 they shut down Boars Head because of a listeria outbreak. The meats that were recalled were Italian Cappy style ham, roasted bacon ham, and garlic bologna. If you don't know what listeria is, it is a bacteria that can be found in soil or raw meat. The six deaths include one from Florida, one from Tennessee, one from New Mexico, one from New York, and two from South Carolina, all from the recall. Overall, according to Mr. Weisman, director of food services in Peekskill, the listeria outbreak did not affect our school in any way.





Simple Science Experiment

You will need:

food coloring, paper towels, and seven cups

- Set up your 7 cups in a horizontal line

- Rip six pieces of paper towel

- Fill every other cups halfway with water (cups number 1, 3, 5 & 7)



Experiment Layout

- Add red food coloring to the end cups (1 & 7)
- Add yellow food coloring in a cup that has water next to one of the reds (cup 3)
- Add blue food coloring in last cup with water in it (cup 5)
- Fold your paper towels into thirds the long way

- Fold your paper towels in half across short length



Experiment Setup

- Dip your paper towel in each cup even the ones with no water

- Let your experiment sit overnight

<u>Multiplying a whole number by a decimal</u> This is hard for a lot of people so this is the solution!

Step 1: Multiplying the place all the way to the right by each digit on the top. Step 2: After you get your answer count how many jumps the decimal is and jump the decimal in the answer.

<u>Multiplying a number by less than 1</u> I know this is confusing because it makes the number smaller so here's the way! Step 1: Do the same thing you would for multiplying 2 by 2 digits. Then jump the decimals & multiply a number by less than 1.

<u>Review</u>

This is a review. Let's see if this helps you. For multiplying 2 by 2 digits do 27x18 don't forget to line each one up vertically! Next round 38.47 to the nearest tenth. And last but not least multiplying a whole number by a decimals, your numbers are 8x1.7



Irish Soda Bread

From The Sheldon-Brungard Family; Oliver, 5th Grade

4 cups flour	½ tsp. Salt	3 TBSP butter
½ cup sugar	¼ tsp ground cardamom	1 TBSP caraway seeds
1 tsp. Baking soda	2 cups buttermilk	½ cup raisins (for a sweeter bread)

<u>To make-</u>

Preheat Oven to 400 degrees, lightly flour a baking sheet, or pizza stone.

Mix dry ingredients in a large bowl: Flour, sugar, baking soda, salt and cardamon.

Using 2 butter knives, or a pastry scraper, place butter into dry ingredients and cut the butter into it, until the butter has become small flour covered pea gravel sized pieces.

Add in buttermilk, mixing until dough begins to pull away from the bowls' edges.

Knead dough on a flour covered surface, making sure to coat the surface and your hands with flour, for 5 minutes. Fold in the caraway seeds for a more savory bread. For a sweeter breakfast bread, also fold in the raisins. Fold these into the dough until well distributed throughout.

Form a ball of dough, and using a sharp knife, cut an X shape into the dough, making sure to cut about ½ to 1 inch into the dough ball.

Place dough on a floured baking sheet or pizza stone, and bake for 45 minutes, or until cooked thoroughly.

*If your bread is browning too quickly on top, you can cover the loaf with a sheet of foil for the remainder of the baking time.

*To check for doneness, lift the loaf off the baking pan. When you tap the bottom center of the loaf, it should sound hollow.

Place loaf on a cooling rack until you can't wait any longer to eat it.

Slice with a bread knife, and serve with butter. Toast leftovers, serve with butter and jam, or eggs.

1 stick unsalted butter softened ¾ c sugar 2 eggs 2 c flour—maybe a little more 2 tsp baking powder (add to flour) 2 tsp anise extract ¾ c chopped almonds (roast in oven for a min. until fragrant)

In a bowl cream butter and sugar. Add eggs. Add flour mixture. Add extract and almonds. Mix well. Use enough flour so the dough is not sticky.

Divide dough into 3 parts and shape into logs about 2" wide.

Grease cookie sheet and place logs. Slightly flatten the tops.

Bake 350 for about 20 minutes. Should be golden. Remove from the oven and slice diagonally. Lay slices on the side and bake for another 10-12 minutes.

<u>Actual measurements:</u>							
2 tbsp Tomato Paste or 1 can c	f tomato sauce	4-6 bone in chicken thighs					
1 tbsp Chicken bouillon		1-2 cups of white rice					

Marinate chicken thighs in adobo, sazon, Dominican oregano, salt, and EVOO overnight

Wash 1-2 cups of rice until the water runs clear

Heat oil up in your favorite pot, add in sprinkle of sugar (this will give your chicken a little color and a nice sear) Fry chicken on each side for up to 6 mins. (you are not cooking it through)

Remove chicken, add in sofrito, tomato paste or sauce, olives, a little olive brine, and a sprinkle more of adobo, sazon, and salt to taste

Add in washed rice, water, and chicken bullion, mix everything together

Allow most of the water to evaporate

Add chicken back in, put lid on (make sure it's a tight fitting lid) and cook on medium low for about 40 mins or until chicken is cooked through.

Enjoy with tostones and aguacate :)
